MESSAGE FROM NETWORK DIRECTOR MESSAGE DE LA DIRECTRICE DU PARTENARIAT DR. LESLIE BROWN



The SES/ÉSD Network

is premised on active partnership – in research and dissemination activities, and in the governance of our network. Since our first team meeting in 2006, we have come a long way toward our goals of generating and mobilizing knowledge about the social economy. Approximately 100 team members have coalesced within six sub-nodes, and more than 30 students have contributed to our work. Over 20 research projects are

underway or completed, and a wide variety of learning and dissemination events have taken place. Members of the network have contributed to over a dozen conferences, addressing a wide range of audiences and generating regional, national and international contacts. Our work is confirming that the region's social economy undertakings are vital for the continued well-being of its people, and for ongoing sustainable development. It demonstrates the "value added" of using the framework and language of the social economy. Together we are creating social and intellectual capital that will contribute to the success of the SE in our region. And we are only at the half way mark of our current funding! I hope you enjoy this inaugural newsletter - we welcome your ideas and comments.

Le partenariat SES/ÉSD

a été fondé sur le principe d'un réseau de partenaires actifs qui poursuivent des activités de recherche et de diffusion et s'impliquent dans sa gouvernance. Depuis la première rencontre des membres du partenariat en 2006, nous avons déjà parcouru un long chemin vers notre objectif, qui est de générer et de mobiliser une meilleure compréhension de l'économie sociale. À ce jour, plus d'une centaine de membres du partenariat s'activent dans les six sous-centres et plus de 30 étudiants ont déjà contribué à notre travail; plus de vingt projets de recherche sont actuellement en cours ou sont déjà terminés et une grande variété d'activités d'apprentissage et de diffusion ont été organisées. Les membres du partenariat ont contribué à plus d'une douzaine de conférences, au cours desquelles ils se sont adressés à des auditoires variés et ont formé des liens aux niveaux régional, national et international. Notre travail

confirme que nos activités en matière d'économie sociale dans notre région sont vitales pour le bien-être continu de nos citoyens et pour la continuité du développement durable dans la région. Il démontre la « valeur ajoutée » que l'on obtient lorsqu'on oeuvre au sein du cadre général et du langage de l'économie sociale. Tous ensemble, nous mettons sur pied un capital social et intellectuel qui contribuera à la réussite de l'économie sociale dans la région. SUB-NODE 1 - MAPPING AND POLICY ANALYSIS

SN1 is coordinated by Dr. Luc Thériault in the Department of Sociology at the University of New Brunswick in Fredericton, NB. (<http://www.unbf.ca/arts/Soci/main.php>) SN1 is working on two separate but related tasks that will increase our understanding of the social economy in Atlantic Canada. “Mapping” is the process of describing the SE and

building a regional profile of some of its components. This descriptive objective may also involve the production of actual maps in an effort to clarify the portrait of the Atlantic social economy. “Policy” research is the process of scanning, describing, discussing, critically analyzing, and proposing policies that may affect the development of the social econ-

(<http://www.upei.ca/islandstudies/>) SN 2 is focused on community mobilization around issues of inclusion and empowerment. Partners in SN2 work on the *inclusion*

of immigrants into PEI society and the economy, *gender equity, aboriginal rights*, access to information for *local governance*, educational opportunities for people with *learning disabilities*, poverty alleviation, empowerment of small-scale *organic farmers* through partnerships, co-ops as a vehicle for *ru-*

(<http://www.msvu.ca/nutrition/index.asp>) SN 3 has, as its overall objective, a commitment to mobilization around a common concern for food security and community economic development.

According to the Dietitians of Canada (2000) “community food security exists when all community residents obtain a safe, personally acceptable, nutritious diet through a sustainable food system that maximizes healthy choices, community self-reliance, and equal access for everyone.” SN3 has been working on two main projects in Hants, Kings

SUB-NODE 4 - MOBILIZATION FOR NATURAL RESOURCES AND LIVELIHOOD

SN4 is coordinated by Dr. Omer Chouinard in the Department of Sociology at the Université de Moncton, NB. (<http://www3.umoncton.ca/>)

SN 4 is focused on mobilization around control over natural resources and livelihood, centering environmental issues and sustainability of communities through the generation of

employment. In Year 2, a number of events and activities were organized around three main research projects involving *watershed groups*, *forestry* and an *agricultural co-operative*. Other projects are under development. Discussion forums were held to validate research results and in response to community groups' need

to understand the term "social economy", and its importance to them. SN4 will increase capacity of community groups to manage forestry, agricultural land, coastal water and watershed resources. SN5 projects focus on co-operatives (management/labour relations), measurement, and finance. The "performance measurement" project has resulted in changes for the research partner in the strategic plan and other aspects of their organization. Another project on *co-operative accounting* has attracted

COMMUNITY PARTNER PROFILE - WOMEN’S NETWORK PEI, INC. (SN2)

Women's Network PEI is a grass-roots, not-for-profit organization that works to strengthen and support the efforts of PEI women to improve the status of women in our society. Women's Network PEI was founded in 1981 and incorporated on May 31, 1984. The organization grew up around *Common Ground*, a magazine telling the stories of PEI women. The

organization operates largely on donations and project-based funding from a variety of government and other sources, and membership fees. WNPEI became a member of SN2 in relation to their analysis of **parental benefits legislation** and its impacts on local women. Volunteer efforts have also developed **BORN** (Birth Options Research Network), which is

dedicated to promoting women’s choices in birthing services, and past projects have included **Creating Safer Communities for Women with Disabilities** and **Youth-Led Sexual Health Policy on PEI**, among others. ACADEMIC PARTNER PROFILE - DR. LUC THÉRIAULT (SN1 COORDINATOR)

Dr. Thériault settled in New Brunswick in 2005 after leaving Regina where he held an academic appointment in Social Work. He joined the SE Network shortly after arriving at UNB. He is Coordinator of SN1 and a Network Co-Director.

“It was a perfect opportunity for me to make new contacts here in the Atlantic prov-

inces,” says Thériault. “I was already studying non-profits and co-operatives in Saskatchewan, so it made sense to join the Social Economy Network.”

To date, he has been actively involved in a major SN1 project, a survey of 296 of Atlantic Canada’s co-ops and credit unions. This project is significant for this region, he says,

“because nobody has quality information in Atlantic Canada about the state of the co-op sector. Our survey should contribute to resolve this in part, at least for a while.”

Luc is one of three PI’s on this project, along with Leslie Brown, and Ron Skibbens (Inspector of Co-ops, Service NS and Municipal Relations). Look for survey results soon!
