We seek candidates with a terminal degree in the biological or biomedical sciences with a strong commitment to pedagogy and a specific interest in teaching and advising undergraduates from a diversity of backgrounds. Applicants having prior experience with evidence-based teaching practices are encouraged to apply; postdoctoral experience is preferred.

Faculty appointments will be made at the teaching track rank of Assistant or Associate Teaching Professor commensurate with current academic standing and achievement (see description of ranks and terms at <a href="http://college.emory.edu/faculty/documents/lecture-track/ltf-policy-appointment-review.pdf">http://college.emory.edu/faculty/documents/lecture-track/ltf-policy-appointment-review.pdf</a>). The teaching track at Emory College was established over 20 years ago and is one of the strongest and longest-running teaching tracks in the country with over 100 teaching track faculty.

Successful candidates will demonstrate experience and ability to teach human anatomy and physiology (A&P) or comparative vertebrate anatomy, as well as other introductory and/or upper-level lecture and laboratory courses in biology. In addition to teaching, commonly four courses per year, successful applicants will be expected to contribute to the academic life and governance of the Department, College of Arts and Sciences, and the University.

The appointee will join a cohesive group of tenure track (26) and teaching track (14) faculty in the Department of Biology, who work collaboratively on the teaching, research, and service missions of Emory University. Department of Biology faculty are committed to creating a respectful community of educators and scholars and seek colleagues who are eager to nurture and support growth of students, staff, and faculty, including BIPOC, LGBTQIA+, first-generation and international community members, as well as community members with disabilities, among others (https://biology.emory.edu/home/about/diversity/index.html).

Items 3-5 should not exceed six pages combined.

Review of applications will start on November 10, 2023.

Applicants selected for first consideration will be asked to have three confidential letters of recommendation submitted on their behalf and will be invited for an initial Zoom interview. Finalists will be invited to Emory campus for an in-person interview.
